ABOUT US

History

ACTS College (ACTS) was first established in 1977 by the Assemblies of God of Singapore as the Bible Institute of Singapore (BIS) to train leaders for ministry. As BIS grew, it was approved by

the Ministry of Education, Republic of Singapore as a religious institution and renamed the Assemblies of God Bible College (AGBC) in 1998. Eventually, AGBC was incorporated as a limited company in 2014 as ACTS College Ltd. ACTS has graduated over 400 students and most of the graduates are actively involved in ministry.

ACTS is a learning community of men and women who want to deepen and broaden their commitments to God. At ACTS, each student encounters God and seeks to know and do His will.

Mission

Our mission is to empower leaders to transform lives and society through education.

Vision

Our vision is to develop a global learning community that will empower leaders to succeed in transforming lives and society.

Core Values

1. Global in learning and community

We bring together students and teachers from around the world, and offer a Christ-centered, biblically-oriented and Pentecostal learning experience that educates leaders for global engagement and lifelong learning.

2. Pentecostal in emphasis

We guide ministers and leaders to develop their spirituality with a Pentecostal distinctive.

3. Missional and contextual in perspective

We train students to commit to God's mission while being aware of the values, beliefs and attitudes in each cultural context.

Strategy

1. Life-changing orientation

We challenge students to continually deepen their relationship with Christ and with one another. Our primary focus is to learn to grow in Jesus so that we can share our rich experiences of God with others in the world.

2. Connected learning

We challenge students to learn actively through collaboration or connection. We emphasise on assisting students to succeed as a group in developing critical thinking to engage with the world, and in building a network of relationship.

3. Globally recognized education

We offer students a quality education that is globally recognised. Our accreditation by the evangelical Asia Theological Association (ATA) ensures that our College is at par with globally acceptable standards of theological education. And our accreditation by the pentecostal-charismatic Asia Pacific Theological Association (APTA) further assures that our theological pursuits are in-step with the global movement of the Holy Spirit.

Governance and Affiliation

ACTS College is governed by the Board of Directors, which consists of pastors and laity. The College Leadership oversees the day-to-day operations. The College is also affiliated with the Assemblies of God Singapore as an Associated Corporate Member.

Accreditation

ACTS has gained international recognition for its excellence in teaching and character building as a Pentecostal learning community. It is fully accredited by the Asia Theological Association ATA and Asia Pacific Theological Association (APTA) for both its undergraduate and graduate programmes in English and Chinese. Its post-graduate programme in partnership with Asia Pacific Theological Seminary (Philippines) is accredited by the ATA and APTA.

Facilities

ACTS College provides facilities for both full-time and part-time students. It has a rapidly expanding library of up-to-date theological books and journals in both printed and electronic forms, and digital media resources. The library is fully computerized to facilitate research. Recreation facilities (a gym and a swimming pool) are also available to improve students' health and sharpen their minds.

General Requirements

The applicant must:

- 1 Have been a believer for at least one year and show evidence of a genuine desire for Christian service.
- 2 Be at least 20 years of age on the date of admission.
- 3 Have completed National Service or be exempted from serving for male Singaporean applicants.
- 4 Have the recommendation of the pastor of the church of which he is a member and two other referees.
- 5 Be proficient in English or Chinese.

Application Procedure

The application form can be obtained from the Administrative Office during office hours. Alternatively, applicants may also download the application form at www.acts.edu.sg.

The applicant should return the completed form with:

- 1 A non-refundable application fee of S\$20 for local applicants or S\$80 for foreign applicants. Cheques, money orders, or bank drafts should be made payable to "ACTS College Ltd".
- 2 Two recent colour passport-sized photographs.
- 3 A copy of the applicants' secondary / tertiary / university education certificate (notarized and translated if not in English). This includes all official certificates and transcripts from previous schools (i.e. college, university and theological college). The applicants could arrange to have their former school send the transcripts directly to ACTS College. Alternatively, the original transcripts could be brought to ACTS College for verification.
- 4 A testimony of conversion.
- 5 A testimony of full-time calling to Christian Ministry. If the applicants do not have a full-time calling, they have to give an account of their reasons and goals for pursuing theological education at ACTS College.

- 6 Three character reference forms. These should include a reference from the supervising pastor or leader of the church in which the applicant is worshipping at and two references from a friend, a colleague, or employer who have known the applicant for more than two years. Spouses, relatives, current students and staff of ACTS College are not acceptable referees. The referees should send the character reference forms directly to ACTS College. The names and full addresses of all the references should be written on the application form so that ACTS College will know who to expect the reference forms from.
- 7 TOEFL or IELTS scores (applicable only to international applicants). Applicants whose first language is not English are required to take the Test of English as a Foreign Language (TOEFL) or a comparable test of English proficiency prior to acceptance. It is the responsibility of the applicants to take the test and to arrange for the scores to be sent to ACTS College.
- 8 A completed medical form by a licensed medical practitioner with the Ministry of Health.
- 9 Additional documents required for foreign applicants only:
 - a Copies of documentary proof of the applicants' financial ability such as a letter of sponsorship or bank statement.
 - b Copies of documentary proof of sponsorship from a local church in Singapore.

The Admissions Committee will not consider applications that do not have all the relevant documents mentioned above.

The applicant must send the completed application form to ACTS before September 1 for local applicants and before July 1 for foreign applicants in order to be eligible for matriculation in the first semester of the following year, or March 1 for local applicants and January 1 for foreign applicants for the second semester of the said year. Applications received after these dates will not be considered for the forthcoming academic semester.

Submission of application form and documents does not constitute automatic admission to ACTS College. All applications will be subjected to review by the Admissions Committee. The Admissions Committee will arrange for an interview with the applicants. After the interview, the applicants will be notified of the outcome of their application by post or email.

All successful applicants will be matriculated into their academic programmes. After which, they may register for their relevant modules.

Application for Student's Pass (for foreign students)

Foreign applicants who wish to pursue full-time studies at ACTS College are required to apply for a Student's Pass. Upon receiving the letter of acceptance from ACTS College, the student will need to pay the Student's Pass application fee of S\$90 (non-refundable, as required by ICA Singapore), a deposit of S\$200 for module fees, and the necessary bank charges.

Dateline for payment of the deposit is one month from the date of acceptance letter and the application for Student's Pass will commence upon the receipt of deposit from the applicants.

The Registrar will facilitate the Student's Pass application procedure by registering the student through the ICA's SOLAR+ system. Students are advised not to enter Singapore until their applications for Student's Pass have been approved.

STUDENT LIFE

Student Handbook

A student handbook is available online at acts.edu.sg/student-handbook. This handbook contains the policies and guidelines for students attending ACTS College. Matriculated students are required to attend all events in the College's academic calendar.

Spiritual Emphasis

The variety of services available at ACTS College underscores its commitment to create a balanced spiritual and learning environment. Each semester begins with Spiritual Emphasis chapel service. In addition, an annual college retreat is organised for the whole learning community in the second semester. All students are encouraged to maintain regular devotions and to serve in the ministries of a local church.



Chapel Celebrations

Chapel celebrations are conducted in the day/night during the semester.

Koinonia

Small group fellowship and prayer are held during the day/night to facilitate closer interpersonal relationships between faculty and students. They are led by faculty facilitators.

World Mission

The Mission Ignite committee seeks to instil mission awareness by means of mission information, prayer for the needs of the world, direct contributions to various projects through faith pledges, and mission outreach.

Housing

Housing arrangements are made by the students themselves.



College Publications

The Lighthouse, an annual publication, highlights the year's events and carries scholarly articles of general interest and contemporary significance.

ACTS Today is a college newsletter to keep its constituents informed of the latest developments at the college.

Guidance and Counsel

The college maintains an open counselling programme to assist the students' development academically, socially, and spiritually. Students are free to seek guidance from those whom they feel are approachable, qualified, and genuinely interested in their welfare.

Engagement / Marriage

Marriage is a lifelong commitment that requires adjustment to life and additional responsibilities. In order not to be distracted from the primary purpose of preparing for ministry, any student intending to get engaged or married must first make an appointment with the Dean of Students for counselling.

Student Life Committee

Each year various students volunteer to serve on the Student Life Committee (SLC). The SLC organises student activities and meets periodically with the Dean of Students to discuss matters relating to students' welfare.



Mission Ignite

Each year various students volunteer to serve on the Mission Ignite Committee (MI). The MI organizes MI chapels and mission outreaches.

Alumni Fellowship

The Alumni Fellowship is open to all graduates and former students of the college. Its primary purpose is to foster continued fellowship among graduates and former students as well as to promote the alma mater in the community.

Academic Load and Matriculation

The academic load is based on the semester system. Each credit hour represents class work consisting of 800 minutes of classroom instruction including the final exam of the module.

A student may not enrol in more than 18 credit hours per semester.

A maximum of 15 credits may be taken without matriculation.

Class Attendance

Students are expected to be present at every class session. They will receive a fail grade if they are absent for more than twice the number of credit hours for a module.

Language Requirements

Additional English language requirements may be added to the student's programme in order to help the student obtain satisfactory English proficiency.

Probation

All students are on probation for one semester. However, the probation may be extended for another semester if students do not maintain the minimum GPA requirement in their particular programme of study. Students on extended probation may not carry the normal academic load.

Incomplete Modules and Withdrawals

An incomplete module must be completed four weeks from the day of the final examination of that module. If the module is not completed after four weeks, the “incomplete” grade will be changed to a “fail” grade.

A student who desires to withdraw from the college must secure an official withdrawal form from the Registrar. The student must return the completed withdrawal form, signed by the Academic Dean, to the Registrar. Failure to withdraw officially will result in automatic fail grades in the modules for which the student is enrolled and possible refusal of re-entry. Official withdrawals from college are graded the same way as withdrawals from modules.

No student may withdraw within the last two weeks of the semester (excluding the final examination week).

Module Numbering

The following system of module numbering is used (the first letter indicate the division of study):

B: Biblical Studies T: History & Theology M: Ministry

The first digit which follows the letter indicates module programme level:

5: Modules in the Certificate, Diploma and Bachelor of Theology programmes. 6: Modules in the Graduate Diploma of Theology, Master of Theological Studies, and Master of Divinity programmes.

The last two digits refer to module sequence.

Transfer of Credits

Students desiring to transfer credits from another college are required to submit an official transcript along with a copy of the college prospectus and/or module syllabi to the Dean of Studies. Transferred modules having fewer hours than ACTS modules will be given the value at which the modules were taken, but those having more hours than ACTS modules will be given the value at which ACTS offers them. ACTS reserves the right to accept or reject work done at another college.

A student may transfer up to one-third of an academic programme’s credits from another college if the modules are comparable to those in ACTS’ programme.



Programme Time Limits

- 1 Students are allowed a maximum of 4 years to complete the Certificate and Graduate Diploma of Theology programmes.
- 2 Students are allowed a maximum of 6 years to complete the Diploma of Theology and Master of Theological Studies programmes.
- 3 Students are allowed a maximum of 8 years to complete the Bachelor of Theology and Master of Divinity programmes.

B500 / B600 BIBLICAL ELECTIVES

The study of a special area of interest in the field of Biblical Studies.

B500A / B600A BIBLICAL HOSPITALITY IN MINISTRY

An exploration of the biblical motif of hospitality in ministry. Emphasis will be given to examining the roles of guest and host in God's economy, and their implications for God's people today.

B501 / B601 BIBLICAL INTERPRETATION

A study of the principles and approaches to interpreting the Bible. Emphasis will be given to developing the skill for an integrated approach to biblical interpretation.

B502 / B602 BIBLICAL LANGUAGES RESEARCH

An overview of the structure of biblical languages and instruction in the use of various tools based on the original languages. Emphasis will be given to the proper use of reference tools to interpret the Bible.

OLD TESTAMENT STUDIES & THEOLOGY

B510 / B610 OLD TESTAMENT ELECTIVES

The study of a special area of interest in the field of the Old Testament.

B511 / B611 HEBREW 1

B512 / B612 HEBREW 2

An introductory study in classical Hebrew designed to give the student a basic understanding of the elements of Hebrew orthography, phonology, morphology and syntax. Emphasis will be placed on grammar and vocabulary building/development.

B513 / B613 OLD TESTAMENT EXEGESIS

An exploration of the various methods and the practice of exegesis in the Hebrew Old Testament. Attention will be given to the study of textual criticism. Pre-requisites: Hebrew 1 & Hebrew 2

B514 / B614 OLD TESTAMENT FOUNDATIONS

A study of each of the 39 books of the Old Testament including its historical background, content outline, major themes and present day significance.

B515 / B615 OLD TESTAMENT THEOLOGY

An introduction to the various approaches to Old Testament theology and the major theological themes in the Old Testament in light of the historical and social environment. Emphasis will be given to Pentecostal and charismatic issues.

B516 / B616 HEBREW NARRATIVES

The study of a special area of interest in the field of Hebrew Narratives.

B516A / B616A PENTATEUCH

A study of the first five books of the Bible seeing God's handiwork of creation, His plan for mankind when sin entered the earth, and an emphasis on the birth and development of a nation chosen by God. God's nature, love, mercy, and guidance of His people will be seen through this study.

B516B / B616B GENESIS

An exposition of Genesis in light of its socio-historical context. Emphasis will be given to major theological themes and their significance today.

B517 / B617 HEBREW PROPHETS

The study of a special area of interest in the field of Hebrew Prophets.

B517A / B617A MINOR PROPHETS

An overview of the times, happenings and cultures of the two primary kingdoms – Northern and Southern. This course will deal with the dates, times, customs and contemporaries of the various prophets. The spiritual conditions of the people will be discussed, along with promises both of judgment and blessings by God during the reign of the various kings and peoples.

B518 / B618 HEBREW WRITINGS

The study of a special area of interest in the field of Hebrew Writings.

B518A / B618A PSALMS

An interpretation of a selection of representative psalms and a consideration of their place in contemporary worship.

NEW TESTAMENT STUDIES & THEOLOGY

B530 / B630 NEW TESTAMENT ELECTIVES

The study of a special area of interest in the field of the New Testament.

B531 / B631 GREEK 1 & B532 / B632 GREEK 2

An introductory study in Koine Greek designed to give the student a basic understanding of the elements of Greek orthography, phonology, morphology and syntax. Emphasis will be placed on grammar and vocabulary building/development.

B533 / B633 NEW TESTAMENT EXEGESIS

An exploration of the various methods and the practice of exegesis in the Greek New Testament. Attention will be given to the study of syntax and textual criticism. Pre-requisites: Greek 1 and Greek 2

B534 / B634 NEW TESTAMENT FOUNDATIONS

An introduction to the message of the New Testament in light of its socio-historical context. Emphasis will be given to major theological issues and their significance today.

B535 / B635 NEW TESTAMENT THEOLOGY

An introduction to the various approaches to New Testament theology and the major theological themes in the New Testament in light of the historical and social environment. Emphasis will be given to Pentecostal and charismatic issues.

B536 / B636 GOSPEL STUDIES

The study of a special area of interest in the field of Gospel Studies.

B536A / B636A MATTHEW

A close reading of the Gospel according to Matthew. Emphasis will be given to Matthew's understanding of Jesus, the kingdom of heaven, and discipleship and its contemporary significance.

B536B / B636B JOHN

A close reading of the Gospel according to John. Emphasis will be given to its theology and major theological themes and their contemporary significance.

B536C / B636C LUKE-ACTS

A close reading of the narratives of Luke and Acts. Emphasis will be given to Luke's understanding of Jesus and the role of the Holy Spirit, and their contemporary significance.

B537 / B637 PAULINE STUDIES

The study of a special area of interest in the field of Pauline Studies.

B537A / B637A ROMANS

An exegetical study of the Epistle to the Romans in light of its socio-historical context. Emphasis will be given to major theological issues and their significance today.

B537B / B637B 1 & 2 CORINTHIANS

An exegetical study of 1 and 2 Corinthians in light of their socio-historical context. Emphasis will be given to major theological issues and their significance today.

B537C / B637C PASTORAL EPISTLES

An exegetical study of 1 and 2 Timothy and Titus in light of their socio-historical context. Emphasis will be given to major theological issues and their significance today.

B537D / B637D Spirituality in Philippians

An exegetical study of Philippians in light of its socio-historical context. Emphasis will be given to major theological issues and their significance today.

B537E / B637E EPHESIANS

An exegetical study of Ephesians in light of its socio-historical context. Emphasis will be given to major theological issues and their significance today.

B538 / B638 GENERAL STUDIES

The study of a special area of interest in the field of General Studies.

B538A / B638A GENERAL EPISTLES

An exegetical study of the General Epistles in light of the socio-historical context. Emphasis will be given to major theological issues and their significance today.

The study of a special area of interest in the field of Historical Studies.

T510A / T610A CHRISTIAN HERITAGE

An interpretative study of the major historical events and movements in the Church from the apostolic age to the present day. Consideration will be given to the history of the Church in Asia.

T510B / T610B PENTECOSTAL HERITAGE

A critical study of the Pentecostal movement including the more recent Charismatic renewal. Emphasis will be given to understanding the dynamics of the movement and its global impact.

The study of a special area of interest in the field of Theological Studies.

T520A / T620A PENTECOSTAL FOUNDATIONS 1 (GOD, CHRIST & HOLY SPIRIT)

An introductory study on the person and ministry of God, Christ, and the Holy Spirit. Emphasis is placed on delineating the essentials of Pentecostal beliefs and their practical implications.

T520B / T620B PENTECOSTAL FOUNDATIONS 2 (MAN, CHURCH & FUTURE)

A systematic study of the biblical, historical and contemporary teachings on humanity, the church and the future. Emphasis will be given to the development of a coherent understanding of the Pentecostal faith.

T520C / T620C HOLY SPIRIT

A study of the Holy Spirit. Related contemporary issues will be evaluated in order to arrive at a sound Pentecostal understanding of the Holy Spirit.

T520D / T620D ASIAN THEOLOGICAL ISSUES

A study of contemporary theological issues confronting the churches in Asia. Emphasis will be given to the development of an Asian Pentecostal theology.

A consideration of the call, qualifications, preparation and work of a Pentecostal pastor. Practical instruction on specific pastoral duties like planning an order of worship, planning a preaching calendar, administering the Holy Communion, conducting weddings, conducting funerals, praying for healing and deliverance, etc. will be given.

M510C / M610C SMALL GROUP MINISTRY

An experimental study of the dynamics of group processes and interpersonal relationships. Emphasis will be given to the philosophies and strategies for building healthy small groups and interpersonal relationships in Christian community.

M510D / M610D PASTORAL COUNSELLING

A general review of the theory and techniques of counselling in the local church setting. It will endeavour to integrate fundamental theological beliefs with developed counselling concepts. Both the advantages and limitations of pastoral counselling will be considered. The character and attitudes of the pastor/counsellor as a person will be a featured emphasis. The place of Scripture and prayer will be a recurring theme.

M510E / M610E LEADERSHIP

An introduction to the leadership disciplines of personal mastery, collaborative inquiry and systems perspective. Emphasis will be given to developing competency for leading sustainable changes in Christian community.

M510F / M610F LIFE COACHING

An introduction to the basics of life coaching. Emphasis will be given to enabling the student to develop skills in self-assessment of their lives with the objective of achieving personal, professional and spiritual goals.

M510G / M610G BIBLICAL HOSPITALITY IN MINISTRY

An exploration of the biblical motif of hospitality in ministry. Emphasis will be given to examining the roles of guest and host in God's economy, and their implications for God's people today.

M510H / M610H ADVANCED PREACHING

A study of a special area of interest in the field of preaching.

M510J / M610J SIGNS, WONDERS & MIRACLES

An exploration of the role of supernatural power, signs, wonders and miracles in Pentecostal ministry.

INTERCULTURAL STUDIES

M520 / M620 INTERCULTURAL STUDIES

The study of a special area of interest in the field of Intercultural Studies.

M520A / M620A FOUNDATIONS OF MISSION

A study of the biblical, theological, and cultural foundations of world mission. Emphasis will be given to the development of a contemporary model for world mission.

M520B / M620B ASIAN RELIGIONS & CULTS

A critical analysis of the basic teachings and practices of major religions and cults in Asia and a comparison of their teachings with Christianity.

M520C / M620C CROSS-CULTURAL COMMUNICATION

An introduction to the principles and processes of intercultural communication. Emphasis will be given to communicating the Gospel cross-culturally.

SOCIAL STUDIES

M530 / M630 SOCIAL STUDIES

The study of a special area of interest in the field of Social Studies.

M530A / M630A ENGAGING CULTURES

An exploration of different forms of cultural belief, expression and practice. Emphasis will be given to the evaluation of contemporary cultural beliefs, expressions and practices in light of Scripture.

M530B / M630B ENGAGING MARRIAGE & FAMILY

An introduction to the nature and dynamics of marriage and family. Emphasis will be given to the development of a holistic perspective on healthy Christian marriage and family, and contemporary marriage and family issues in Singapore.

M530C / M630C ENGAGING HUMAN DIVERSITIES

An introduction to major concepts and methods in cultural anthropology. Emphasis will be given to developing an awareness of culture and society, and an integrated strategy for analysing and serving in diverse sociocultural contexts in this globalised world.

M530D / M630D ENGAGING GLOBAL ISSUES

An exploration of global issues affecting contemporary communities. Emphasis will be given to developing a Christian response to global issues.

EDUCATION STUDIES

M540 / M640 EDUCATION ELECTIVES

The study of a special area of interest in the field of Education.

M540A / M640A LEARNING IN CHRISTIAN COMMUNITY

An introduction to the process of learning in the context of Christian community. Emphasis will be given to integrating learning within the formation of community.

An introduction to the process and ministry of teaching-learning within the Christian community. Emphasis will be given to developing creative teaching strategies to facilitate learning in the Christian community.

An experimental study on teaching-learning in theological education. Emphasis will be given to analysing, designing, developing, and evaluating the teaching-learning process in a learning community in order to produce quality teaching-learning in theological education.

An opportunity for student to experience, in depth, the full role and meaning of teaching in a learning community. Emphasis will be given to planning and organising for instruction, developing teaching competencies and skills, and evaluating learner progress in a learning community.

M540E / M640E EDUCATION PSYCHOLOGY


A study of the psychology of learning and teaching. Emphasis will be given to developing and understanding human development, learning and motivation, and their educational implications for teaching-learning.

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

DOCTOR OF MINISTRY

(in collaboration with Asia Pacific Theological Seminary)

Overview	The Doctor of Ministry (DMin) in Pentecostal/Charismatic Ministries is designed to provide quality education and training in selected areas of Pentecostal/Charismatic ministries. The program aims to enhance the participant's personal growth toward maturity and professional competence in the practice of ministry and to prepare gifted scholars and qualified ministers for teaching positions in Bible colleges. The DMin programme offers formal coursework, plus interaction and evaluative structures.
Entry Requirements	Applicants must have an acceptable Master of Divinity (GPA 3.3 from a recognized Bible College or its equivalent). Applicants must also have a minimum of three years active ministry experience. International applicant whose native language is not English must submit proof of English proficiency equivalent to 550 on the TOEFL (IELTS 6).
Format	Courses are conducted on one-week block (Mon-Fri: 9.00 am-6.00 pm) thrice a year (viz. January, May, and July). All pre-reading (1500 pages) and pre-assignments must be completed one week before the course begins. Final Research Project may be done on APTS campus on request.

Requirements for Graduation:

- 1 Completion of 8 modules / 24 credits with minimum GPA of 3.0 or "B" (as listed below)
- 2 Completion of Comprehensive Exam
- 3 Completion of Research Project including Oral Defense
- 4 Faculty approval of Christian character and conduct
- 5 Settlement of all financial obligation with the Administration Office
- 6 Attendance at Graduation exercises (unless special permission for absence is obtained)

A student who has received two course grades below B minus for work done at any stage of the course will be reviewed by the Post-Graduate Programmes Committee for possible termination from the programme.
